1 Historical Background

1.1 Introduction

In April 1961, the Passport office obtained the secretariat status under the Ministry of Home Affairs. In October 1961, Directorate of Immigration and Passports was established as an attached department, under Ministry of Interior.

In the year 1974, an Act of Parliament (Passport Act 1974), was passed for the issuance of passports, and regulation of the Entry & Exit process in the country. Later in 1975, the Headquarters of the Directorate General Immigration and Passport was shifted from Karachi to Islamabad.

The Directorate General, Immigration & Passports primarily is a public service organization with the mandate of providing vital national services, including issuance of Passports, Citizenship, Naturalization, Renunciation Certificates maintenance of Foreign Control List/ Passport Control List.



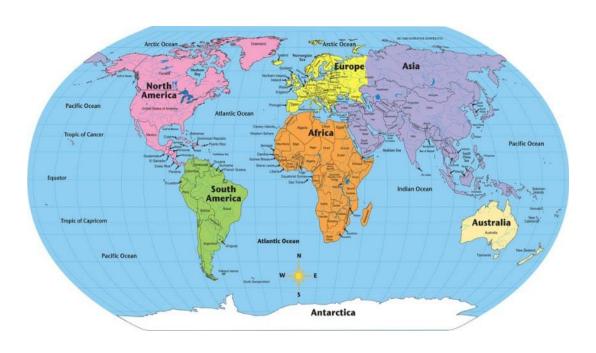

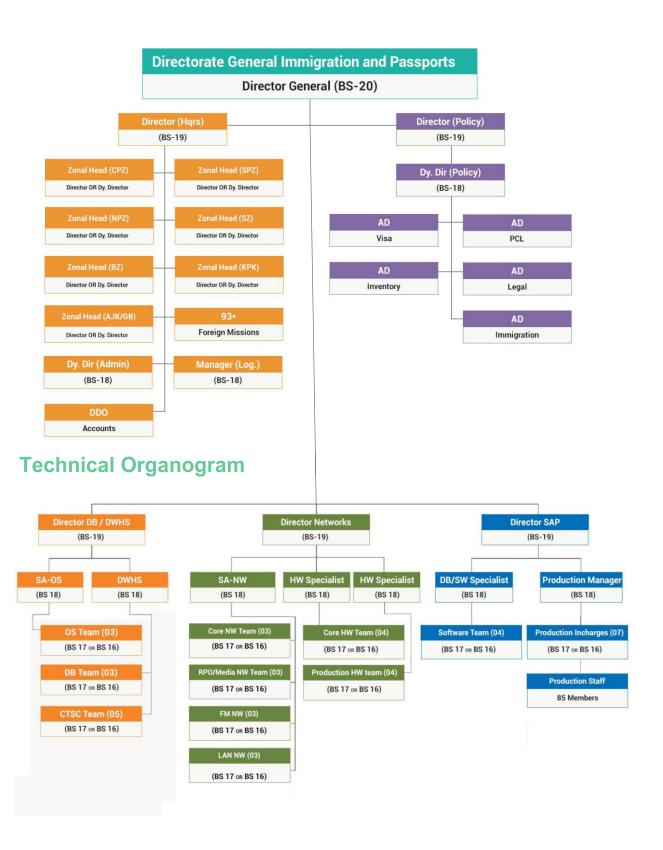

1.4 Organogram



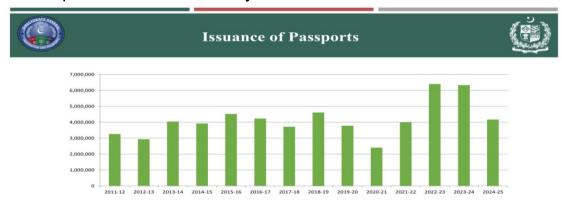


2. PERFORMANCE OF PASSPORT OFFICES

2.1 Issuance of Passports

The issuance of Passports to Pakistani Citizens is the core service of the Organization. The processing of Passport applications is distributed across the country, and being carried out through its 232 field offices in Pakistan, and 93 Foreign Missions abroad, while Passport Printing, Data Warehouse and Network Center are being managed at HQs, Islamabad. Printing of the Passports, and its onward distribution across country and to the Pakistan Missions abroad is done through the courier services.

The department has successfully issued a total of 71,669,005 since 2004-05, including over 55 million MRP passports within 17 years, averaging approximately 3.4 million passports per year. However, the recent surge in passport applications over the past 2 years has resulted in the issuance of approximately 13 million passports, averaging around 6.7 million per year. This unprecedented increase in workload has led to the gradual exhaustion of resources in passport issuance, including the supply chain, production facility, IT infrastructure, and human resources. It has also brought to light the inadequacies of the current system.

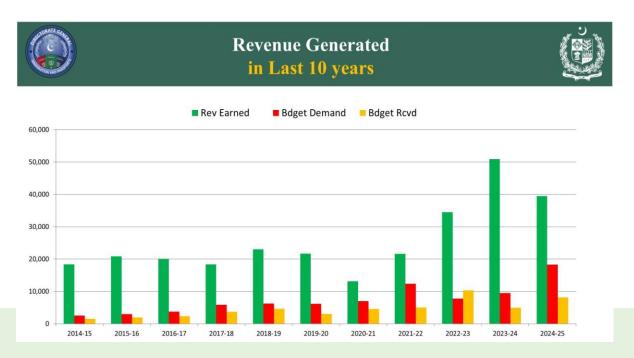


Passports Issued 71,669,005



2.2 Revenue Earned

The Directorate General, Immigration & Passports is the largest revenue earning department, which contributes very significantly in government exchequer. The revenue generated by this department in last 16 years is amounted to **Rs.295.7 Billion**, with average earning of **Rs. 20 Billion** per year. However, in the last two years, the average earning has reached to **Rs. 40 Billion**, and is expected to cross Rs. 50 Billion next year. During Financial Year 2023-24, DGIP has contributed <u>revenue of Rs. 50,906/- (Million)</u>, on account of Passport fee and allied services in the national exchequer.

2.3 Revenue vs Budget Allocation

On average, Directorate General, Immigration & Passports demanded 30% funds out of the revenue generated in last 10 years while after rigorous efforts, succeeded to get only 20% of the revenue and around 65% of its demand inclusive of supplementary grants. Allocation of untimely and inappropriate funds against the demand, aggravated the financial challenges. Following table shows the demand, allocation and short fall despite the huge revenue earned.

2.4. Issuance of Citizenship and Renunciation Certificates

The Directorate General of Immigration and Passports is responsible for managing the country's Immigration Services, which include issuance of Pakistan Citizenship, Naturalization, and Renunciation of Certificates. Details of Pakistani Citizenship and Renunciation Certificates issued from 21-08-2023 to 31-12-2024 are as under:-

An increasing trend has been observed that the Overseas Pakistani Diaspora is applying for Renunciation of Pakistan Citizenship through Pakistan Missions abroad. This Directorate issuing Renunciation Certificates within 3 to 4 weeks upon receipt of the application.

DGIP in collaboration with NADRA, is trying to block the CNICs of individuals who have obtained Renunciation Certificates in the past but their CNICs are still active. To prevent the fraudulent possession of CNIC, a Policy is also underway to cancel the CNIC before the issuance of the Renunciation Certificate.

2.5 Passport Control List / Foreign Control List:

This Crucial function is being performed under Rule 22 of Pakistan Passport Rules, 2021. The Federal Government has entrusted the powers to DG I&P to regulate the departure from and entry into Pakistan and also visits to foreign countries of its citizens under the Passport Act 1974.

The Division concerned and Directorate General shall prepare and maintain a Passport Control List for placement of names and another record of individuals who have been refused passport facilities under these rules under categories "A" and "B" respectively.

2.5.1 Passport Control List (PCL):

Total Individuals Placed on PCL: 77,956

Total Individuals Removed from PCL: 17,284



2.5.2 Foreign Control List (FCL):

Data of Foreigners were Placed on FCL 214, while 23 were removed.

2.6. Online Issuance of Passports

Initially, an Online passport processing facility was provided only to the overseas Pakistani diaspora. However, after successful launching and standardization, this facility was further extended to inland Passport applicants, those who cannot visit local RPOs. A separate Passport application processing wing is established at DGIP, To facilitate Passport applicants and manage the online applications before proceeding for printing. 3. UP-GRADATION OF IT INFRASTRUCTURE

The issuance of passport is a specialized job in nature that involve technical integration of various databases, live data acquisition, and comparison with data retrieved from the NADRA data warehouse, each record has to be scrutinized through Integrated Border Management System (IBMS) to ensure that not any non-entitled, imposter, blacklisted, wanted can succeed in getting a Pakistani Passport. Moreover, before the personalization of any Passport Booklet, there are multiple technological checks incorporated, like Automated Finger Identification System (AFIS), Facial recognition Engine, etc.

The passport application processing and data transmission are carried out through a highly secured Network and infrastructure to ensure encrypted data transmission to meet the internationally recognized security protocols. Any security breach can compromise the passport database and National security. In continuation of upgradation of DGIP network, to enhance the network security and web application security to mitigate all application layer attacks, the DGIP network team installed and configure the web application firewall (WAF) for all DGIP applications (Passport tracking, IBMS tracking etc.)

3.1 Shifting of Foreign Mission Links from Obsolete Firewall to Newly Procured NGFW

Machine Readable Passport centers deployed at Pakistani Foreign Missions are very critical. Previously all Foreign Mission Network Links were converging on outdated Routers in DGIP. The Foreign Missions were converged on two different devices and both have either reached EOL or their Licenses expired. All Phase-I Foreign Missions were terminated on a very old NORTEL device since 2004-05.

DGIP team completely overhauled the Foreign Mission's Network Links, decommissioned, and replaced them with top-of-the-line NGFW (Next Generation Firewall). All Foreign Missions are now accessing the DGIP Core Network through Multi-layered topology.



3.2 Up-gradation and Shifting of NADRA and Extra-Net Links

All Passport Issuing Offices at Home and Abroad while processing Machine-Readable passports or E-Passport, have to verify their Citizen Records from the NADRA database. This link was established in Year 2006 and is now shifted to a new dedicated firewall. Shifting of this link was achieved with Zero downtime and without any disturbance in routine operations.

There are many other Organizations also linked with DGIP Headquarters, through outdated devices, outdated routers and firewalls. To replace obsolete devices, and to enhance the security, these Extra-Net Links have now been shifted to more secure and dedicated Firewalls.

3.3 Enhancement of Internal Local Area Network Security

DGIP Local Area Network (LAN) consists of many virtual LANs to separate the functions of various wings and sections. The LANs were earlier managed by Layer-3 Switches which are now replaced with state-of-the-art Firewall and the industry's standard of "Router on a Stick Approach". The up-gradation of LAN was achieved with zero downtime. Furthermore, the LAN of printing and production facility, Diplomatic and Official Passport (DOP), online Section and public reception are revamped, installed and configured with zero down time and new switches.

3.4 Revamping of DGIP Core Network Infrastructure.

Over the years, many of the DGIP Core devices and Wide Area Network infrastructure have been obsoleted and outdated. DGIP IT team initiated the revamping of both WAN and Core Network, replacing copper with Optical Fiber, enhancement of bandwidth, and overhauling obsoleted devices, the revamping process is about to be completed.



3.5 Addition of New Passport Counters and Network Links

Despite meager resources, shortage of manpower and funds, the overall number of RPOs and Passport issuance centers are continuously increasing. DGIP Network and data center have accommodated the following new Passport offices and counters which were established during the last year:-

- i. Establishment of Punjab Assembly site
- ii. Establishment of Sind Assembly site
- iii. Establishment of KPK Assembly site
- iv. Establishment of PPC Zafarwal Narowal
- v. Establishment of PPC Shakergadh Narowal
- vi. Establishment of BAR Council Karachi
- vii. Establishment of BAR Council Faisalabad
- viii. Establishment of Bahawalpur BAR Council
- ix. Counter Expansion and up-gradation of RPO Chaman
- x. Establishment of RPO Qilla Abdullah
- xi. Establishment of RPO Jamrood (Khyber)
- xii. Establishment of PPC Kahutta and Taxilla
- xiii. Establishment of Passport Counters, at NADRA Mega Centers Karachi Nazimabad, Siemeans and Lahore, Shimla Pahari, MAO Collage, NRC PECO Road.

4. Human Resource:

The DGIP has only sanctioned 1857 Human Resources to man Machine Readable Passport issuance and allied services/functions of the organization at home and abroad, details are as under:

4.1 Creation of New Posts:

DGIP Administration Wing has forwarded cases for the creation of new posts regarding newly established Regional Passport Offices in the light of Finance Division (Expenditure Wing) Office Memorandum No.F.7 (1) Exp.IV/2016-1079 dated 17-12-2018, for seeking relaxation of the ban on the creation of posts regarding Austerity Measures, the details of ongoing cases are appended below:

- ➤ In response, the Austerity Committee, Finance Division has sanctioned 30 posts at thirty (30) new Passport processing counters and 12 posts at Regional Passport Offices Khyber and Killa Abdullah.
- > The DGIP forwarded the case to Ministry of Interior to notify these posts.

4.2 Recruitment Drive:

4.4 Regularization of Services of Contractual Officers:

The regularization of services of officers was referred to the Federal Public Service Commission in the light of the Islamabad High Court Judgment dated 21-06-2018 passed in ICA No. 340/2017. Consequent upon recommendations of FPSC, the Secretary, of Interior has regularized services of approximately 115 officers in the Directorate General, Immigration & Passports.

4.5 DGIP staff posted abroad:

The DGIP provides valuable Machine Readable Passport and other services to the overseas Pakistani diaspora through MRP facilities installed at 93 Embassies / Consulates of Pakistan. MRP operations at 49 Missions are being manned by DGIP staff, whereas, the remaining missions are manned by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. Presently, 97 DGIP staff members are performing duties at Missions abroad. The DGIP has initiated



a process for the replacement of these staff which will be completed shortly.

5. Passport Printing Facility:

The incumbent Director General assumed the charge on 21.08.2023. This was the time the department was facing several challenges resulting in delayed passport issuance to the citizens within Pakistan and living abroad. The challenges relating to passport production are elaborated below:

5.1 Obsolete Passport Personalization Equipment:

The existing Passport production facility was established in 2004 merely to cater to the workload of 28 Regional Passport Offices, whereas, with the vision to reach out to the applicants the department has expanded its RPO / PPCs up to 232 and 93 Pakistan Missions abroad.

The DG passport, immediately after assuming charge considered this sensitive matter on a very serious note and took it up at all relevant forums to seek their concurrence and floated an international tender for the procurement of the latest passport production equipment. The production printers have been procured on a war footing basis and now the production facility is running in smoothly manner.

5.2 Issues Relating to Supply of Security Laminate:

Huge financial constraints were also involved in ensuring a smooth supply of security laminate resulting in delay in passport issuance. Timely payments to suppliers and customs authorities were badly disturbed resulting in the delayed shipment of security laminate to the passport department that ended up in piling up of backlog.



The DG passport made a comprehensive strategy to overcome the financial constraints particularly for security laminate by taking personal interest and coping with the situation with financial stakeholders by making timely payments to laminate suppliers and customs authorities. This brought massive relief to the applicants whose future relied upon the provision of a passport and it's highly appreciated by the Overseas Pakistani Diaspora.



5.3 Issues Relating to Supply of Security Ink and Spares:

A smooth supply of security ink and spares of passport personalization equipment was also a major challenge that was long-lasting. Being obsolete; the equipment is always in need of technical support i.e. repair and troubleshooting that is carried out by the Directorate General, Immigration & Passports technical team.



Timely supply of these items also involved financial constraints and procedural delays that were successfully tackled by reviving a smooth supply of security ink and spares that were also procured from abroad.

5.4 Timely Provision of Passports to Hajj Pilgrims:

Due to the worst situation relating to passport issuance, the DG passport realized the situation of the people intending to perform Hajj 2024. Resultantly, the DG passport contacted the Hajj Directorate of the Ministry of Religious Affairs & Interfaith Harmony, Islamabad, and asked for the provision of details of intending pilgrims. Within time, all passports of Hajj pilgrims both applied from home and abroad were personalized and dispatched to respective offices for delivery, bringing huge relief to these Hajj & Umrah Pilgrims.

5.5 Timely Passport Issuance to Zaaireen-e-Iran & Iraq:

The same strategy was adopted for Zaaireen-e-Iran & Iraq so that every intending pilgrim gets the passport in time.

5.6 Expansion of Production Hall:

For the first time since the inception of MRP issuance in 2004, the DG passport seriously took the issue of limited space of the Production Hall



into consideration. This hall was designed to manage the workload of a total of 40 field offices both within Pakistan and abroad. Presently, the workload of all field offices within Pakistan and abroad is being managed in the same limited space and congested environment, it was getting more and more difficult every day.

With the approval of the DG passport, construction of a whole new block attached to the main building is completed. With the expansion of production hall, more of passport equipment installed and ultimately increases daily passport issuance capacity.

5.7 Up-gradation and installation of new Printers and Laminators

The existing printers and machinery was acquired in year 2005 for passports printing. Since then, this equipment has been in continuous use without any upgrades. Due to the expansion in the scope of work by increasing the number of field offices at home and abroad, the workload on passport production had risen extraordinarily.

Recently, the DG Passport Purchased 10 Passport Printers and 11 Laminators installed in Production center to enhance printing capacity. Moreover, 6 desktop MRP machines are also being procured.

5.8 Security Measures:

The DG passport took serious notice of the entrance of unauthorized staff members within the premises of the production hall and made the following security measures:

- a) Biometric-based sliding door entry for authorized staff only.
- b) Access control system installed.
- c) Installation of additional CCTV cameras for improved surveillance.
- d) Physical checking of staff members at the entrance and exit is carried out by security guards who are also rotated after a specific period.
- e) Installation of a cargo elevator specifically for passport shipments from the Production Hall situated at third floor, that would directly descend into the Distribution section without stopping at any other floor.
- f) Making emergency exits for staff members in case of any catastrophe like earthquake and fire etc.

5.9 Cash Reward

The Director General Immigration & Passport introduced cash rewards as well as other incentives like overtime, lunch, etc for the staff members of the Production facility who sacrifice their weekends and also give extra time to personalize more and more passports. The worthy Director General also celebrated Independence Day this year with staff members of the Production Hall. Appreciating their untiring efforts, the Director General also announced cash rewards for staff members.







The passport production facility worked in three shifts 24/7 for the personalization of passports to meet the requirements.

5.10 Measures for e-Passport Operations:

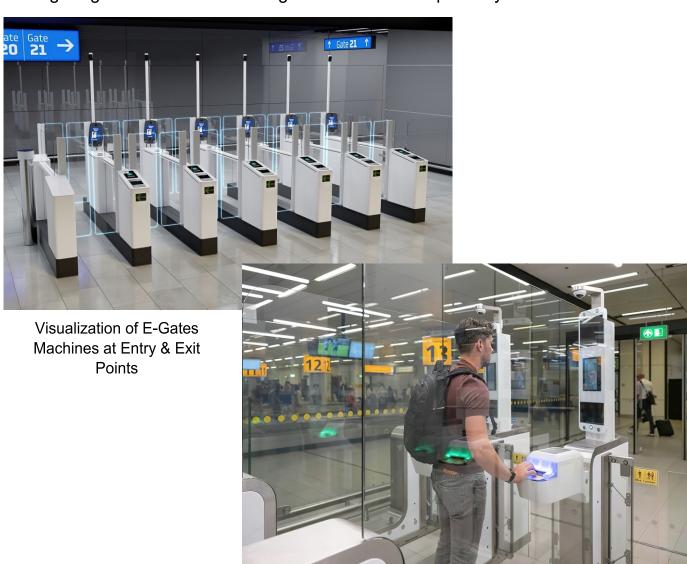
The E-Passport operations were partially suspended due to a halt of technical support from the vendor. Only Official and Diplomatic passports were being issued from the E-Passport facility. The Director General Passports ordered bringing back the E-Passport machine at full capacity and also issued directives to expand the E-Passport facility to the general public as well.

Procurement of two additional E-Passport machines with the latest technology is also underway so that international commitment to switching from MRP to E-Passport could be fulfilled within the minimum period.



5.11 E-Gate, E-Passport Scanning:

Directorate General, Immigration & Passports has taken the initiative of technology transformation from Machine Readable Passport to e-passport personalization. The E-passport system was first introduced on a pilot basis which is running successfully. To shift the full load of passport applications with secure passport issuance recognizable worldwide, world-renowned e-passport personalization machine manufacturers (OEM) were invited to participate in the bidding process. The system development, installation, and preparation of the e-passport production facility according to ICAO's security and quality standards is underway and will be completed by the end of the financial year 2024-2025. Pakistan will be able to issue polycarbonate e-passports to all of its citizens enabling them to cross through e-gates or seamless immigration counters respectably.

5.12 Corrective Measures Taken for Distribution Section:

Fast Track passport facility was initially incepted for 12 cities. However, this facility has now been extended to 87 cities.

The distribution section was also congested where booking staff of Postal and Courier Company were also seated, apart from passport shipments received from the production hall. Construction of an expanded portion of the Distribution section is also completed.

It was very difficult for overseas Pakistanis to spare their time to visit the nearest embassy/consulate for passport renewal/collection so the DG passport decided to introduce online passport home delivery for such applicants for their facilitation.

Several complaints were being received from the passport sections situated in Pakistan embassies/consulates around the globe as well as from home delivery applicants that their passports were not being delivered by the foreign courier in time. Also, delivery service was not available in a few countries such as Russia, Ukraine, etc due to war. The DG passport resolved the issue by taking corrective/alternate measures for the courier to deliver the passports well in time.



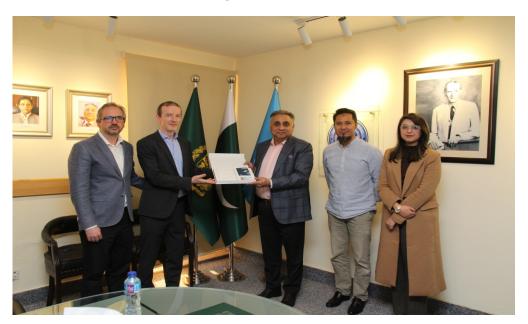

7. Joint Task Force Proceedings on 12,096 Pakistani Passports Handed Over by Saudi Authorities

The Saudi Ministry of Interior has forwarded 12,096 Pakistani passports through the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, KSA. These passports had been sent by the Afghan Embassy to the Saudi Ministry of Interior, and surrendered by alleged Afghan nationals who acquired Pakistani passports and traveled to KSA. These 12,096 passports were then forwarded to DGIP for further probe into the matter.

Since the matter was of national importance as the incident not only severely damaged Pakistan's repute worldwide but also attempted to jeopardize working opportunities for the Pakistani diaspora in KSA and also for those who are aspiring to work in KSA.

Therefore, the Ministry of Interior took serious notice of the matter and constituted an inquiry committee headed by the Director General, Immigration & Passports to conduct a detailed probe into the matter vide Notification No. 2/1/2023-Pass (P&C) dated 15-10-2023. Members of the committee comprise senior officers of the Ministry of Interior, NADRA, and FIA. The Terms of Reference include "to determine the responsibility of various officers in NADRA, DGIP, and FIA, etc in the process and suggest remedial measures to curb this menace in future".

Thereafter, Ministry of Interior, on report of various cases of unauthorized access, pilferage, impersonation and involvement of different officials, constituted a Joint Task Force (JTF) – in supersession of its earlier Notification No. 2/1/2023-Pass (P&C) dated 26-10-2023 – headed by Joint Director General (Intelligence Bureau) and comprising of senior officers of NADRA, PTA, FBR, ISI, FIA, MI, Ministry of Interior and DGIP.

DGIP performed a detailed probe into the matter which revealed that out of 12,096 surrendered passports, 7,613 were original, whereas 4,483 were fake/tampered. In compliance with the requirement of the JTF, DGIP shared the data and lodged 37 complaints in CTW, and FIA. Moreover, departmental fact-finding is also initiated against remaining employees who processed passport applications of reportedly non-nationals. Based on



shared data, CTW, and FIA started investigations and registered 21 FIRs against these employees, the case is under investigation.

As far as fake/tampered passports are concerned, a detailed analysis and forensic of 4483 fake Passports was conducted. The forensic report revealed that out of 4,483 fake passports, there was a photo swap on 491 while 1,161 both data and photo was changed while on 2,506 passports, multiple forgery was found. Moreover, there was original lamination found on approximately 3,500 passports which were issued to various users in production at different times. Those who were found guilty of lamination theft were reported to JTF and FIA, while the departmental inquiry was also initiated against those who were suspected to be involved in this case.

7.1 Forensic Audit.

As mentioned above Directorate General Immigration and Passports received 12096 passports from the Embassy of Pakistan in Riyadh. DG I&P started thorough investigations regarding the issuance of these passports and found that out of 12096 passports, 7613 passports were issued to Afghan Nationals having legit/ original ID cards and 4483 passports were forged/ tempered. For 7613 passports, DG I&P filed 37 complaints to the Counter Terrorism Wing of Federal Investigation Authority against DGIP's officials.

DG I&P's forensic section started a thorough investigation regarding these 4483 forged/ tempered passports and found that these passports were issued to the rightful Pakistani citizens but forged/ tempered at a later stage, while many of the passports had original stolen laminations, other passports had fake laminations. Upon further investigation, two main culprits from the production department of DGIP were identified regarding the lamination theft, both of the culprits were handed over to the Counter Terrorism Wing of the Federal Investigation Authority for further investigation and criminal cases were registered against them. Moreover, other Embassies based in Pakistan e.g. British High Commission also shared around 59 forged/ tempered passports and they were also verified and found to be forged and laminated with fake laminations and were sent



to CTW FIA for further investigation and identification of Human Smugglers/ Agent Mafia and passport holders whose passports were tempered by changing their whereabouts e.g. father's name to get the visas maliciously.

Forensic Section has so far, solved many other cases of forged and tempered passports which were sent by different Intelligence Agencies as well as Anti Human Trafficking Cell AHTC-FIA, passports recovered from human smugglers during the Lahore raid by FIA, passports recovered from human smugglers/agents mafia during raids of Director General Passports at Gujranwala and Gujrat region in collaboration with security agencies, etc and cases sent by Military intelligence and Canadian High Commission, Islamabad. So far, the Forensic section has approximately identified and worked on more than 5000 forged passports with limited resources. Currently, DG I&P is in the process of procuring the Latest Forensic Equipment which DG I&P couldn't procure due to limited financial resources, though several attempts were made time and again to get the requisite equipment.

7.1.1 Forensic Training Sessions.

Director General Immigration and Passports collaborated with several Embassies/ Consulates based in Islamabad regarding the matter of forgery/ tempering of travel documents including passports and visas. In this regard, several important meetings were conducted with the British High Commission, the Fraud Detection Unit of the US Embassy based in Islamabad, Italian Embassy Officials, Norwegian, Hungarian, and Japanese Embassy officials, etc. and comprehensive training sessions were conducted regarding the security features of Pakistan's Machine Readable Passports and e-Passports to the above mentioned Embassy's Visa Officers, and how to detect forgeries and tampering.

During these meetings, the Director General along with the technical team provided a comprehensive overview of the ongoing initiatives aimed at aligning Pakistan's passport standards with the latest international benchmarks. The primary goal is to enhance the security features and prevent the misuse of these travel documents by unauthorized individuals.

In a concerted effort to strengthen cooperation, the Director General and foreign diplomats mutually agreed to foster a close collaboration between the Directorate General of Immigration & Passports and **Embassies** concerned. This collaborative aims facilitate approach to about coordination in matters immigration and passport affairs between Pakistan and the United Kingdom, the USA, The Republic of Hungary, Japan, The Italian Republic, The Kingdom of Norway, etc.

After sensitizing the above matter, several training sessions for Foreign Delegations were also conducted regarding the security features of Pakistan's passports and verification methods to discourage misuse at different border their controls. These exercises aimed to increase the chances of visa issuance to the rightful passport holders like Government Officials, the business community, students, and patients in need of traveling abroad.

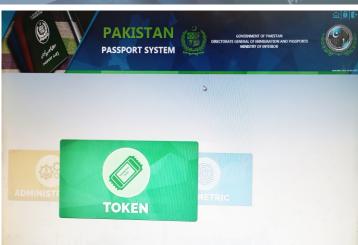


8. Database/Operating System Section Progress Report

8.1 Software deployments:-

Database & Software team have successfully up-graded software applications all over the Pakistan from old versions PPMS (5.0, 5.6) to latest PPMS (15.0, 17.0 version) which have new features adds i.e One window operation, E-Passport, Online Fee verification, IBMS Integration etc.





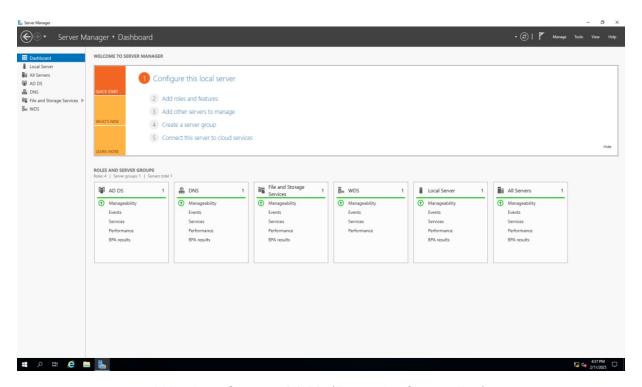

Revamping of passport tracking system with secure features has been implemented by software team.

8.2 Window Server 2019 (Domain Controller Deployment):-

A Primary domain controller has been installed/configured, deployed and a domain "impass.gov.pk" has been successfully created. All the intranet PC's of different sections have been joint new domain and managed with domain controller through Window server 2019 Active Directory, In addition different Group Policies i.e. block the USB, snipping tools & control panel etc. has been implemented. Working to deploy an additional domain controller a replica for PDC.

8.3 Security Policy implemented:-

Server based security policy implemented on MRP Oracle (12C) Database server & Client which cover the user management, log management, password policy, comprehensive activity monitoring and sophisticated auditing capabilities.

8.4 Migration from MRP data from Old to New Storage:-

Database team have purchased and deployed newly storage unity which is ready for migration. Migration of MRP from old storage (Dell EMC 5400) to be shift on new storage (Dell UNITY 480) with the initial software management and configuration of new devices (SAN Switch, TAP Library TL-4000 to ML-3, Hot backup Data Domain 2500 to DD 6400). Furthermore, DD-6400 successfully migrated; Tape Library ML-3 successfully migrated. However, tender in process regarding SLA (Service Level Agreement).

8.5 Major achievements:-

- One window processing counter in all major cities of Pakistan and separate counter for females citizens.
- Successfully deployed one window operation in Dubai embassy & Saudi Arabia.
- Successfully integrated Delta 900i printer with production database.

8.6 Daily Routine Operations:-

- Monitoring of AFIS & Facial machine engine which to used to check fingerprint and picture.
- Installation of OS (linux, esxi & windows) on RPOs/FMs/EPOs/PPCs servers
- Monitoring of CCTV camera recording.



- Administration of Zimbra email both internet & intranet (passport reset, new user creation & complaint launch to NTC through webmaster)
- Provide Level III services to all different sections of HQ and all field offices throughout Pakistan and Abroad.
- Management of e-Passport services.

9. Central Technical Support Center (CTSC) Operations:

9.1 Remote Software deployments:-

The CTSC team deployed and supported the New Passport Application through remote access latest Pakistan Passport System (PPS) Application build (version 1.0.1.15, 17) at RPOs/PPC/EPOs to enable Fast Track facility, Online Fee Application, E-Passport, Real-Time IBMS status.

9.2 New Passport Counters deployments:-

The CTSC team manages and supports the new passport processing counters at the National Assembly, KP Assembly, Sind Assembly, Bar councils, Chambers, and Passport Processing counters in NSRC (National Swift Registration Centers) NADRA offices all over Pakistan.

9.3 RPO Islamabad, Lahore, Karachi / Passport counters at NADRA Mega Centers, Lahore & Karachi, 24/7:-

The CTSC team supported and arranged the Pakistan Passport Management System (PPMS) application user transfers, Passport tracking user's rights, and IBMS Portal user management to run the MRP operations (24/7) smoothly at Lahore and Karachi RPOs and Passport counters at NADRA Mega Centers, Lahore and Karachi.



9.4 New Building Shifting of RPO ISLAMABAD:-

Successfully deployed Passport applications at new RPO Islamabad Building and integrated with an additional counter of one window operations 24/7.

9.5 Implementation of new upgraded Portals-

All portals of passport processing are updated/shifted with security features (HTTPS) in WEB Browsers including the Passport tracking portal, online web portal, IBMS, E-Mail (Zimbra) at all RPOs, EPOs, PPC, and FM.

9.6 Daily Routine Operations:

- ➤ Provided 24/7 technical support to RPOs, EPOs, PPC, and FM, ensuring zero downtime. This includes troubleshooting and remotely installing software.
- ➤ Coordinated with OS, Network, database, and Hardware sections for further follow-up/escalation at Level-2/3 support
- ➤ User management of passport applications (RPOs/EPOs/PPC/FMs) as per office orders from the competent authority.
- ➤ Providing Diplomatic/Official/Ordinary Port Services to all MRP issuing offices as per request.
- ➤ Technical Incident / problem and event management to maintain ongoing operational efficiency.
- ➤ Ensure the implementation of Standard Operating Procedures to ensure the smooth operation of the MRP system all over the Pakistan and abroad Missions.



10. General Administration of Directorate General, Immigration and Passports

The years (2023 & 2024) have been very challenging, General Administration Branch completed multiple tasks successfully. Detail of some key achievements:-

10.1 Shifting and Up-gradation of Regional Passports Office, G-10, Islamabad.

The Regional Passports Office, Islamabad is one of the busiest passport offices. The old building did not have enough space to cater to the needs of a huge number of passport applicants. Complaints were received regularly regarding the location of the office and the lack of facilities for passport seekers. Therefore, the Director General, of Immigration and Passports decided to shift the passport office, in Islamabad to a new building where applicants can be easily facilitated, so the Regional Passports Office, Islamabad has been shifted from G-10 Markaz to G-10/4, a newly constructed rented building having enough facilities.





The Regional Passports Office, Islamabad has been upgraded as state-of-the-art office, equipped with modern IT equipment, a luxurious sitting area, and an increased number of data and decision counters. The details of the office are as under:

- The rented building is newly constructed.
- Passport processing 24/7
- Separate wide space for the general public in the waiting area
- Separate space for senior citizens



- Installation of the latest cooling / heating system
- Provision of clean drinking water
- Installation of new furniture
- Increased the number of processing counters
- Installation of new Queue Management machines for token
- A play area for the children has been made for the first time in the passport office
- Wide space for car parking
- Prayer Hall for passport seekers
- Newly established washrooms

10.2 Shifting and up-gradation of Regional Passport Office, Shadman Lahore

The Regional Passport Office, Shadman Lahore has also been shifted into the newly constructed building to facilitate the passport applicants. The Regional Passport Office, Shadman is also one of the busiest passport offices in the country. The Director General took an expeditious action to shift the building. The details are as under:-

- Up-graded spacious building located in the heart of the locality
- Separate ample space for applicants in the waiting area
- Separate space for senior citizens
- Installation of the latest cooling / heating system
- Provision of clean drinking water
- Installation of new furniture
- Increased the number of processing counters
- A play area for the children has been made for the first time in the passport office
- Wide space for car parking
- Prayer Hall for passport applicants
- Newly established public washrooms

10.3 Up-gradation of Regional Passport Office, Rawalpindi

The building of Regional Passport Office, Rawalpindi has been upgraded / renovated to facilitate the general public in processing their passports.

• The office has been equipped with the latest IT equipment, and the latest cooling / heating system, enhancing the waiting area.



 Installation of digital token display screens /LEDs and increased the number of passport processing counters.

10.4 Up-gradation of Regional Passport Office, D.I.Khan

The Regional Passport Office, D.I. Khan has been upgraded and equipped with all the requirements needed to facilitate the general public in



processing their passports. The office was in dilapidated condition and never upgraded. It was for the first time that the Regional Passport Office, D.I. Khan has been given a new look with the provision of all the facilities required for general public comfort.

10.5 De-Centralization of Passport Distribution at Saddar Karachi

The Passport Distribution has been De-Centralized from Regional Passport Office Saddar Karachi by establishing new offices at the respective locations of Karachi division.

10.6 Establishment of Passport Processing Counters

In collaboration with NADRA, the Directorate General, Immigration and Passport establishes its passport processing counters throughout the



country to facilitate applicants in that area where the Regional Passport Office of the city cannot be accessed easily. Moreover, these Passport Processing Counters are also established in those areas where VIPs can be facilitated such as Courts, National Assembly, and Provincial Assemblies etc. Therefore, Passport Processing Counters are newly established in the following areas:-

> Parliament of Pakistan

A Passport Processing Counter has been established in the National Assembly of Pakistan to facilitate the members of the National Assembly, Senators, and their families.

Sindh Provincial Assembly

A Passport Processing Counter has also been established in the Sindh Assembly to facilitate the members of the Sindh Assembly and their families.

Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Provincial Assembly

A Passport Processing Counter has also been established in the KP Assembly to facilitate the members of the Assembly and their families.

> PPC Kahuta

A Passport Processing Counter has been established in the Kahuta to facilitate the applicants.

10.7 Declaration of the Passport Headquarters building as critical infrastructure

Keeping in view the sensitivity of the Passport Headquarters and installations therein. the Director Immigration and General. Passport moved a proposal for the declaration of the passport headquarters building as critical infrastructure to ensure its sanctity and security. The Government Pakistan has approved the proposal and the Passport Headquarters' building has been declared as critical infrastructure.





10.8 Repair, Maintenance, and Up-gradation of the Directorate General, Immigration and Passports (HQs) building

The building of the Directorate General, Immigration and Passports (HQs) is being revamped and upgraded. The building of the Headquarters was in deteriorated condition. As per the vision of the Director General of Immigration and Passports, the building is being upgraded, as state-of-theart outlook which will be an addition to the aesthetic look of Islamabad.

11. Software Section

11.1 Business Process Re-engineering of MRP Production Facility Operations:

The existing MRP passport production facility is not operating according to ICAO guidelines. ICAO recommends the execution of one passport process by one operator to avoid pilferage of data and passport materials. In Production Facility, Printing and lamination processes are being executed by one operator resulting in misuse and theft of lamination patches. Lamination patch misuse can be stopped if each distinct process is executed in separate boundaries within the production facility. Quality control will also be improved. The production facility was running in a factory fashion rather like a laboratory supervised by officers which does not comply with ICAO guidelines. Directorate General, Immigration & Passports has completed its software in this regard. The new machinery / printers installed to enhance printing capacity shortly.

11.2 Data sharing with security agencies for proper monitoring and vigilance.

Directorate General, Immigration & Passports has established secure links with security agencies e.g., Military Intelligence, Strategic Planning Division, and Federal Investigation Agencies. These agencies monitor the Passport Processing / NOC and movement of their personnel. Directorate General, Immigration & Passports is sharing data efficiently as per their requirements. Revamping of real time data sharing system for immigration is completed which will enable FIA to control immigration counters at airports and entry/exit points.

11.3 MRP Revamp, Business Requirement Document:

The Directorate General, Immigration & Passports in collaboration with NADRA initiated revamping of Machine Readable Passport (MRP) system, initially designed in 2004-05, which is outdated in consideration of recent biometric advancements.



12. Hardware Section

12.1 Upgradation of Power infrastructure for Data Centre:

The power infrastructure of DGIP is the backbone of the operations. Recently, following up-gradation was done for reliability and to minimize the downtime to the critical infrastructure (load) of DGIP HQ.

- Installation of Surge Protective devices (SPD)
- Installation of Phase Shifter (Protector) to avoid any downtime due to phase shifting
- Procurement of 500KVA Generator is under process as the redundant source.

12.2 Deployment of 24/7 Passport services:

To facilitate the public of Karachi, Lahore & Islamabad, Passport Office Karachi Awami Branch, Islamabad and Lahore (Garden Town) were operationlized for 24/7 with upgraded infrastructure and state of the art equipment and facilities to the public.







12.3 Up gradation of RPOs.

- Regional Passport Office, Rawalpindi was upgraded with the latest facilities to serve the public. One window counters were deployed so that the waiting time may be reduced to under 10 minutes for each applicant for the complete process.
- Regional Passport Office, Chaman was up graded with state of the art equipment to facilitate the local public, as required by the security agencies to maintain the Entry / Exit records while passing the Afghan-Pakistan Border.
- Passport facilitation desk / Passport Processing Counter was deployed at GHQ to facilitate the officers and their families within the premises of GHQ.
- Regional Passport Office, Islamabad and Lahore (Shadman) were upgraded with best facilities for the public. Both the offices were shifted to the new buildings with enough space to cater the day-by-day increasing demand for passports in these cities. The one-window setup minimized the processing time to less than 10 minutes per applicant.

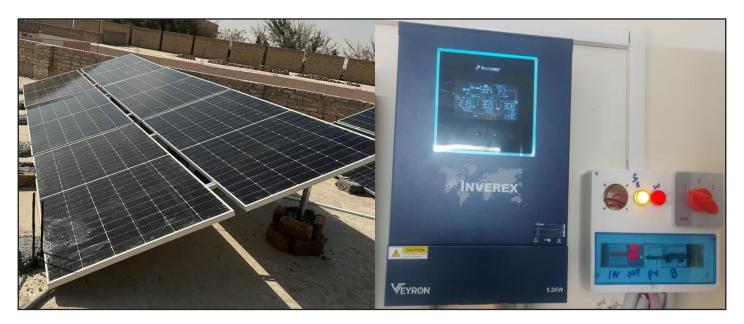
12.4 Deployment of Passport Facilitation Desk & Passport Processing Center.

- The Passport Facilitation Desk at Sindh Assembly & KPK Assembly to facilitate the Honorable Members / Families of Sindh and KPK assembly were deployed with one window setup at the said sites.
- The Passport Processing Center at Zafarwal & Shakargarh (Narowal), to facilitate the residents of Zafarwal and Shakargarh Passport Processing Counters (PPC) were successfully deployed and functional.

12.5 Installation of Solar Power Systems.

To cater for the diesel expenses of the generators during the Load shedding / Power cutoff, Solar Power Systems (Green Energy) were installed at the various Regional Passport Offices. It not only reduces diesel expenses but also provides a redundant power source and friendly to the environment. Some of the RPOs equipped with Solar Power Systems (Green Energy) are as follows:-

12.6 Induction of New Passport Personalization Machines.

- Hardware Team played a vital role in the actualization process for the Procurement of MRP Desktop Machines for the MRP facility by technical evaluation to enhance printing capacity. The procurement process is in the final stage and will be actualized in the near future.
- Technical evaluation was completed for the procurement of Forensic Equipment. The procurement process is in the final stage and will be actualized in the near future.

12.7 Installation / Up-gradation of CCTV.

All sensitive areas at Hqr are being monitored with the latest CCTV cameras including MPR facility, e-Passport facility, Data Center etc.

For the vigilance and monitoring of the Regional Passport Offices CCTV cameras were installed at various passport offices. The process of installation of Cameras in the remaining offices is under process.

12.8 Technical support to the critical infrastructure.

Since 2004, Hardware Team providing the technical support to the MRP production personalization equipment's without any technical support / SLA by OEM with minimum downtime. The team not only successfully caters the downtime of the production personalization during the backlog but also enhance the life of the obsolete equipment with proper maintenance & care.

Hardware team also providing the technical support to the e-passport personalization machine without OEM principal/ local support.

14.1 Introductory meeting with Zonal Heads of all provinces

Director General Immigration and Passports in his introductory meeting with Zonal Heads of all provinces on 28th August 2023, shared his vision for improvement in passport standards by adaptation of latest technology and practices.

The Director General issued directions on the following points:

- 1. To rationalize the inflow and outflow of Passports by introducing an online appointment system.
- 2. To rationalize staff at Regional Passport offices as per need basis to effectively handle workload.
- 3. Prior intimation to applicants about Passport status through the launching of SMS service.
- 4. And to evolve mechanisms for data security and storage by implementing remote storage and multi-layer security protocols.

The Director General also issued instructions to all Zonal Heads to raise public service delivery standards by increasing public facilitation and by proactively addressing their grievances.

Director General Immigration & Passports presided over a pivotal virtual meeting with the Zonal Heads representing all provinces. During this meeting, the Director General demonstrated deep concern over the substantial influx of the public at Regional Passport Offices.

To enhance public convenience and streamline the management of these overwhelming crowds at Passport offices, the Director General has articulated the following directives:

- 1. Strict Adherence to Office Timings and Public Service Hours for the issuance of Passport Processing tokens.
- 2. Routine Inspections of Regional Passport Offices by the respective Zonal Heads.
- 3. Continuous Engagement with the general public by the responsible Office in charge and Zonal Heads, addressing their concerns immediately.
- 4. Maximizing the utilization of office personnel by aligning staffing levels with the specific requirements.
- 5. Advance notification to citizens via SMS services, informing them of the current status of their Passport Processing stage.

Furthermore, the Director General has firmly expressed his commitment to a zero-tolerance policy concerning corruption, malpractices, and any connection involving office staff in issuing passports to individuals who do not meet the entitlement criteria.

This resolute stance underscores the Director General's dedication to ensuring transparency, efficiency, and integrity in the passport issuance process.

The Director General of Immigration and Passports, extended a warm welcome to the Honorable Secretary of Interior during his visit to Directorate General Immigration and Passport Headquarters.

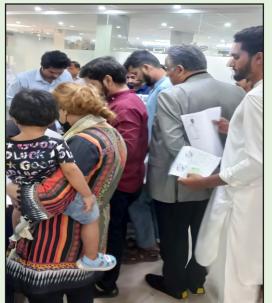

- Establishment of 32 Passport Processing counters (PPCs) across the country.
- For the facilitation of Honourable parliamentarians, PPCs are established at National and provincial Assemblies
- > Establishment / up-gradation of Passport Processing counters at Air and Naval Headquarters/ Karachi.
- Decentralization of Passport distribution at Regional Passport Office, Saddar Karachi.
- ➤ 24/7 passport service at NADRA mega centers Lahore and Karachi and RPO Islamabad, Lahore & Karachi.
- > Establishment of **PPCs** at Kahutta and Taxilla.

16.2 PSDP Projects

To make advancements in Passport system in compliance with ICAO standards, the Directorate General, Immigration & Passports launched following PSDP projects.

- "Up-gradation of biometric identification system for passport applications".
- Construction of buildings for 13 Regional Passport Offices in Sindh (PSDP-Project).

process. Now there is no liability on account of pay & allowances and production consumable items.

17. MAJOR INITIATIVES

The Directorate General, Immigration & Passports, to revamp its infrastructure, IT equipment, networking, data warehousing, Human Resource capacity building, policy reforms and industrial level state-of-the art Passport printing facility has taken following initiatives:

- Development of Integrated Dashboard with One Data Regime.
- ➤ Working to establish **Disaster Recovery (DR) backup** at the most secure place at GHQ.
- > Integration of Seamless E-Gate Immigration System.
- ➤ Working to launch Emergency Travel Document (ETD) based on **Machine Readable Zone (MRZ)** to digitalize the authenticity.
- Development of Mobile responsive application.



- Online payment of Passport Fee through Passport Fee Asaan App / Jazz Cash.
- > On the instructions of Ministry of Interior, the Directorate General, Immigration & Passports made huge efforts and



held several meetings with various stakeholders to introduce Refugee Travel Document (RTD) for the Burmese Muslims residing in Saudi Arabia.

- ➤ Inclusion of various categories in Online Passport services i.e. for new born babies, modifications, reprint lost, damaged and reprint pages exhaust.
- ➤ Initiated a proposal for establishment of "Pakistan Immigration & Passport Authority" with the concentration on financial and administrative autonomy.

17.1 Establishment of Authority:

The Directorate General, Immigration & Passports is passing through highly critical challenges to meet financial and administrative requirements to keep the operations smooth.

Therefore, it has been decided that the department need complete Autonomy to revamp and reimage the issuance of Passport and allied services without causing any difficulties to the citizens of Pakistan. In this regard, the department has submitted a proposed draft for establishment of "Pakistan Immigration & Passport Authority Act, 2024" with the concentration on financial and administrative autonomy.

In this regard, a meeting was chaired by the Secretary, Interior to deliberate on a consultative process of all stakeholders. Salient features of the proposed Authority are as under:

- ➤ To upgrade the production facility with state-of-the-art industrial machines alongwith capacity building of Human Resource.
- ➤ To establish the Disaster Recovery (DR) infrastructure (backup) at the most secure place GHQ.
- > Development of Integrated Dashboard with One Data Regime.
- ➤ To assist the Law Enforcement Agency to perform the function of Immigration, at all entry and exit points through regulating / validating travel documents and to operate E-Gates, by integrating the Authority's databases and data warehouse.



- ➤ Revamping and up-gradation of databases, data warehouses, networking, interfacing, integration and Software development.
- ➤ The Authority shall, in respect of each financial year submit for the approval of Division concerned a statement showing the estimated receipts and current and development expenditure.
- The Authority shall maintain complete and accurate books of accounts of its actual expenses and receipts.
- ➤ The Authority shall carry out audit of its accounts by the auditors who are chartered accountants, according to the Chartered Accountants Ordinance, 1961 (X of 1961) appointed by the Federal Government in consultation with the Auditor General of Pakistan.

17.2 Digitization of Citizenship Manual record:

Keeping in view of the digitization framework and government policy towards e-filing and process automation, DGIP approved to transform Immigration Branch with its un-structured data for PCCs, NCs and RCs into structured and meaning immigration database, as detailed under:

It is obvious that data collection is un-structured and require to be reviewed and organized yearly for better management and automation. Manual files are being transformed into e-filing system by scanning PCCs, RCs and NCs issued in past. Data is required to be transformed into database with storage for new Immigration interface design.

It is pertinent to mention that a parallel approach is being adopted by developing a database of Pakistan Immigration System-(PIMS) to record PCCs, RCs and NCs. However, new web-based module for



RCs i.e. Immigration Tracking System (ITS) is also in the process of development.

Both PIMS and ITS software will be integrated with foreign missions, DGIP and MoI to track and register Citizenship, Renunciation and Naturalization cases with its secure, centralized and integrated database. Following Key Milestones have so far been targeted:-

- 1. 21.08.2024 Approval of proposal by DGIP for development of PIMS Database.
- 2. **12.09.2024** Completion of PIMS software re-configuration and operator training.
- 3. **14.09.2024** Commissioning of PIMS Database and software with system-generated Certificates
- 4. 14.11.2024 Completion of the scanning process for PPCs, RCs, NCs.
- 5. **30.10.2024** Immigration Tracking System (ITS) development completed.
- 6. **21.11.2024** Quality control and final review completed.
- 7. 24.11.2024 Final project report submitted to DGIP.

17.3 Policy Reforms:

The Directorate General Immigration has taken initiatives to bring policy reforms keeping in view security, sanctity of the country and for the betterment of Citizens of Pakistan which includes amendments in Citizenship Act, 1951 and Passport Rules, 2021.

17.3.1 Amendment in Pakistan Passport Rules, 2021:-

The Directorate General Immigration proposed a draft bill regarding amendment in Rule 6 Jurisdiction, under which every Citizen of Pakistan may apply for Passport services from any Passport office irrespective of their address recorded in the Computerized National Identity Card (CNIC) / National Identity Card for Overseas Pakistanis (NICOP) / Child Registration Certificate (CRC).

17.3.2 Omission of Rule 17(2)

Ministry of Interior has been requested for omission of Rule 17 (2) of Passport Rules 2021 Rule regarding issuance of Passport to those Pakistani Nationals who are Asylee / Asylum seeker in foreign host countries.

17.3.3 Amendment(s) in Pakistan Citizenship Act, 1951:-

A large number of Pakistani Diaspora are complaining that they renounce their Pakistani Citizenship as condition for acquiring Citizenship Pakistan, there is no provision within Pakistan Citizenship Act, 1951 which allows resumption of Pakistan Citizenship. Therefore, Amendments have been proposed in Section 14-A of the said Act which will allow Pakistani Diaspora to resume their Pakistani Citizenship.

17.3.4 Amendment in Section 4

A bill regarding Omission of Section 4 is proposed. Every Person born in Pakistan will be a Citizen of Pakistan under Section 4 of Pakistan Citizenship Act, 1951. Based on Section 4, Courts in dozens of cases, have directed Ministry of Interior / Government of Pakistan to consider grant of Nationality to the children of Afghan nationals born in Pakistan. Every year thousands of children are born to Afghan Refugees in Pakistan. Moreover, grant of Nationality under Section 4 tends to create an incentive for the



afghan nationals to enter into Pakistan through illegal and legal means. Over population is also a Major challenge for Pakistan. The matter is just not limited to children born to Afghan parents but also other foreign nationals. Grant of Pakistani Nationality by descent is already covered under Section 5 of Pakistan Citizenship Act, 1951 which states that a person born after commencement of Act ibid, shall be a citizen of Pakistan by descent if his parents is a citizen of Pakistan at the time of his birth.

17.3.5 Amendment in Section 5

Amendments in <u>Section 5</u> of Pakistan Citizenship Act, 1951 has been proposed for commencement of effect to the ordinance of XIII of 2000 encompassing actions, events and circumstances that transpired its enactment since commencement of Pakistan Citizenship Act, 1951.

17.3.6 Amendment in Section 20

Draft amendment proposed in Section (20) of Pakistan Citizenship Act, 1951 to include Citizenship by investment Program.
